# University Library/ASI 24/5 Zone - First Semester Usage Report

### **Executive Summary**

In the summer of 2016, Associated Students, Inc. (ASI) and the University Library began a partnership to create a 24-hour study space accessible to the CSUSM campus community. A successful fee referendum in Fall of 2016 secured student funding for 24-hour Library services.




FIGURE 1 - KELLOGG LIBRARY 24/5 ZONE

Following a year of collaboration between the University Library, ASI, IITS, UPD, and other campus partners, the 24/5 Zone's staffing, spaces, and services were ready for use by CSUSM students. The 24/5 Zone (see Figure 1) officially opened its doors on Sunday, August 26<sup>th</sup> of 2017.

The University Library is using several methods for assessing the 24/5 Zone and use of its services, including "Accudemia" attendance software, security gate pass-through counts, hourly manual headcounts, and other methods for tracking questions and service use. Data collected across all sources points towards strong early adoption of the 24/5 Zone and significant user engagement with its spaces and service.

### 24/5 Zone Use Trends

During Fall of 2017 in 16 weeks of operations:

- 1,353 unique student visitors used the 24/5 Zone a total of 4,057 times.
- Student use of the 24/5 Zone began slowly in the early weeks of Fall semester, picked up steadily through midterms, dipped slightly towards the Thanksgiving holiday, then increased through the end of finals.
- Sunday night/Monday morning was the busiest service evening, accounting for 24% of total 24/5
  Zone use over the semester. Wednesday night was the second busiest with 22%, followed
  closely by Tuesday night with 21% of total use.
- The 24/5 Zone was busiest between midnight and 2AM; this period accounted for 71% of total space usage in the first service semester.
- Hourly space headcounts show a near-even even split in seating occupancy between computer workstations (32%), group study rooms (32%), and study tables (31%).
- According to student login data, the top three reasons for visiting the 24//5 Zone were for general study (58%); use of computers (16%); and group study (15%). Nearly 3% of the students also identified the need for a safe overnight study space.
- Library 24/5 staff addressed 834 questions and/or issue reports, with the top 5 questions being related to supplies (172), technology (140), Library-related inquiries (129), 24/5 service questions (95), and Accudemia inquiries (67).
- The Snack Room, supplied by ASI and the Cougar Pantry, was very popular, particularly when the 24/5 Zone was at its busiest during mid-terms and finals.



# Resolution to: Support CSUSM Project Rebound Resolution 2018-02 Authored By: Yomira Zamora, VP of Student & University Affairs

- Whereas, the Associated Students, Inc. of the California State University San Marcos (CSUSM) Board of Directors is the official governing body of the students of CSUSM; and
- Whereas, Associated Students, Inc. (ASI) of California State University San Marcos is the primary advocate for students at CSUSM and is dedicated to providing services designed to create and enhance a learning-focused campus environment; and
- Whereas, it is ASI's mission to serve, engage, and empower students, ASI has the responsibility to inform CSUSM students about issues that affect our student population; and
- Whereas, a survey conducted by the Transitions Collective student organization stated that out of a sample size of 163 at California State University San Marcos, 8% have been formerly incarcerated and 71.8% are system impacted individuals (persons who have experienced confinement or if a significant other, next to kin, or friend has been affected by having loved ones incarcerated); and
- Whereas, San Francisco State University's (SFSU) Project Rebound was founded in 1967, with the vision of successfully re-integrating formerly incarcerated individuals into society via higher education, by John Keith Irwin, PhD, and a formerly incarcerated individual who taught for 26 years in the Sociology Department at SFSU; and
- Whereas, nine other California State University (CSU) campuses-- Sacramento, San Bernardino, Fresno, Bakersfield, Fullerton, San Diego, Pomona, Long Beach, and Los Angeles-- are enrolling formerly-incarcerated individuals into the program, assisting students to graduate with baccalaureate degrees, earn advanced academic degrees and become more valuable members of society; and
- Whereas, the Project Rebound Regional Team and Jason Bell, Regional Director of Project Rebound, endorse the replication of this program at California State University San Marcos; and
- Whereas, Palomar and Mira Costa Community Colleges both have the Transitions Program for formerly incarcerated students. CSUSM must meet the regional needs of formerly incarcerated students and system impacted individuals; and
- Whereas, a program like Project Rebound will provide all the resources such as mentoring, recruitment, tutoring, retention and academic success necessary to empower our students; and

- Whereas, Project Rebound at San Francisco State University's 2016 year-end report shows that 95% of formerly incarcerated people who pursue higher education do not recidivate. This program alleviates the problem that leads to high rates of recidivism in way that are cost effective to the State of California and empowering formerly incarcerated and system impacted communities; and
- Whereas, The Academic Senate California State University at Office of the Chancellor as of January 26<sup>th</sup> 2018 passed a resolution to support the implementation of Project Rebound by urging the Governor of California and the California Legislature to provide funding for Project Rebound by transferring funds from the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation; and
- Whereas, according to The Legislative Analyst's Office, the State of California, in 2017-2018, allocated 11.3 billion to California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation<sup>1</sup>. Corrections account almost 9% of California general funds, while the University of California and the California State University System collectively receive 5.2%<sup>2</sup>; and
- Whereas, the U.S. accounts for 5% of the world's population yet houses more than 20% of the incarcerated population of the world<sup>3</sup> costing California State tax payers 7.7% of the State budget<sup>4</sup>; and
- Whereas, the U.S. Department of Education stated that congress, in 1994, via a federal crime bill, made incarcerated individuals ineligible to receive Pell Grants, then former President Barack Obama introduced the Second Chance Pell Program that allows incarcerated individuals to apply for student Financial Aid prior to being released so that they may take advantage of educational opportunities upon release to pursue higher education with the goal of helping them get jobs, support their families, and transform their lives<sup>5</sup>; now therefore, be it
- Resolved, that Associated Students, Inc. at California State University San Marcos will support the implementation of Project Rebound to help formerly incarcerated and system impacted students transition into higher education and succeed in their respective communities,
- Resolved, that Associated Students, Inc. at California State University San Marcos will urge campus partners to provide foundational resources that support program infrastructure to help recruit and support student success through admission, retention, advising, graduation and be it further,
- Resolved, that Associated Students, Inc. at California State University San Marcos encourage the California State University San Marcos Academic Senate to endorse Project Rebound as a program to be expanded and replicated throughout the California State University system,




