Heidi Breuer

Heidi has been teaching at the college level since she started her M.A. in 1995, and she has been a professor since 2003, first at Wright State University in Ohio, and then at CSUSM since 2007. Her original training is in medieval and Renaissance British literature grounded in an intersectional feminist & sexuality studies perspective, but her interests have branched out quite a bit since then to include speculative fiction, comics/graphic fiction, and popular culture studies more generally (especially neo-medievalism). She's always been interested in monsters and marginalized figures, and that interest has carried through to today.

Her previous publications (including parts of her book, *Crafting the Witch: Gendering Magic in Medieval and Early Modern England*) are examples of "personal criticism" or "autobiographical criticism." Personal criticism mixes scholarly and creative approaches to textual analysis: it's a hybrid genre in which traditional literary analysis integrates with elements of memoir and creative non-fiction. Making the shift to creative work seemed only natural as it marries her recent work in speculative fiction and comics to her original fascination with monstrous figures in productive and surprising ways.

Sandra Doller's writing focuses on linguistic innovation, anti-disciplinarity, and conversations between art forms. She is the author of several books of poetry, prose, and cross-genre text, including *Oriflamme*, *Chora*, *Man Years*, and *Leave Your Body Behind*. She has also co-authored two collaborative books—*Sonneteers* and *The Yesterday Project*—and a translation of the French poet Eric Suchere, which won the Anomalous Press Translation Prize. Doller is the founder and editor of the internationally renowned 1913 Press, and a recipient of the Paul Engle-James Michener Fellowship, the Iowa Arts Fellowship, and two individual state artist grants. She received an MFA from the University of Iowa Writers' Workshop and an MA from University of Chicago, after completing a BA in Women's Studies at University of Washington and coursework in Theatre & Dance at Amherst College. Before joining Cal State San Marcos in 2007, Professor Doller taught in the MFA programs at Hollins University and Boise State. Sandra lives in La Mesa with her partner, their kid, and a puppy.
