Increasing Access to Healthy Food in North San Diego

Rural Mobile Food Pantry Overview

In 2008, 49.1 million people—including 16.7 million children—were uncertain of having or unable to acquire enough food for their families during the year (ERS, 2008). Poverty continues to be predictive of food insecurity. For those who are dependent on agriculture as a livelihood, the season to season income fluctuations engender financial instability, resulting in unmet nutritional needs of farmworker and rural families. In 2007, California grossed more than 36.5 billion in agriculture, however today's farmworkers living in rural communities throughout California are struggling to feed themselves (CDFA, 2007). Insufficient food and access is compounded by the economic downturn in communities across the nation.

In an effort to increase access to food in farmworker, low income rural communities in North San Diego County, the National Latino Research Center (NLRC) at California State University San Marcos partnered with Feeding

America, Vista Community Clinic, Rainbow Community Church and Neighborhood Healthcare Pauma Clinic to launch the Mobile Food Pantry. In 2010 Feeding America

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received funds to purchase a refrigerated truck to transport food to rural communities. The 10 door truck is stocked with fresh fruits and vegetables, dairy, staple items, and grains; each truck load serves 400 families. The mobile pantry currently operates twice a month at eight locations throughout North County. In addition to receiving food aid,

VOLUNTEER COORDINATION IN NC

NLRC has been documenting barriers families encounter in accessing nutritious food in California. NLRC has hosted regional meetings in North San Diego County bringing together community-based organizations to discuss outreach efforts, share promising outreach strategies and resources, discuss emerging challenges, and devise promising solutions to enhance outreach efforts. Additionally, NLRC provides linkages with service providers to safety-net resources.
