SPEECH-LANGUAGE CLINIC GOES VIRTUAL

The summer session of the Speech-Language Clinic marked the first use of telehealth at CSUSM since the dawn of the pandemic – the trial run for a practice that will continue this semester and may become a staple throughout the health care industry depending on how long COVID-19 lingers in the United States.

"We're being told by our national governing board that telehealth is going to stay for some time, past COVID," said Laura Coca. "Not that we're going to be solely doing telehealth, but we're going to be seeing a lot more folks that way."



At the advice of its national certification board, the Cinic returned this summer by serving only clients who aren't profoundly impaired. But because the clinic will be virtual only for the rest of the calendar year, and likely beyond, it developed a workaround that will allow clients who rely on assistive communication devices to take advantage of the same Zoom service as everyone else.

"I think it's more convenient for certain patients," Laura said. "We'd be able to serve a wider scope of patients – those who are homebound, people who are in rural communities. If we could make it something that is viable for the students and the community members, it could become a long-term asset."

ORANGE TREES BY PAUL VANDER PLOEG

Interesting facts:

It was once thought that oranges were native to Florida but were actually brought over by Spanish explorers. Oranges were called "Valencias" in Spanish.

How I planted my orange tree:

- I made a box so the tree will do well.
- I got dirt mixed with special fertilizer, coir (coconut fiber), and perlite. I
 put in ½ of the coir and perlite into the mixture.
- I dug a big hole under the box and placed soil in it, along with chicken wire to keep gophers from getting in.
- I put all the dirt and fertilizer in the box, then dug a hole to plant the
 orange tree. There are many things you can fertilize with, such as NPP
 (nitrogen phosphorus and potash) and calcium.
- I water the tree once a week with a regular hose.

Before the oranges grow, there are white flowers that have a beautiful smell. I have two or three oranges on my tree. Some were orange so I ate them, they were good! The green ones are not ready yet.

THE 3 SISTERS OF GARDENING BY RANDY NYGAARD

The 3 sisters of gardening started with the indigenous people to grow vegetables (traditionally corn, beans, and squash) where you have limited space. They used this to grow vegetables to make the most use of your garden space. Plant beans around some corn and then some shade vegetables like lettuce or squash to protect the soil from the sun. Keep the soil moist a long time between waterings. I have used the 3 garden sisters technique and it has been a success.

When to plant varies depending on what vegetables you would like to grow because it is conducive to the season.

- Once you decide what vegetables you want to grow then you need to select the location on your property: the most convenient place with the best atmosphere.
- Next, you need to prepare the soil for the seeds and to level the planting area and place
 the seeds in the soil that is recommended on the seed packet. Then, water the soil and
 seeds and make sure it is wet throughout.
- Last, wait until the plants have sprouted from your garden which the seed packet will
 inform you of how long the germination process takes. Once the corn sprouts you need
 to wrap the beans around to make the beans grow up the stalks. Then it will grow on its
 own with just water. If seeds did not sprout reevaluate the location or watering habits.

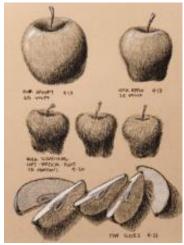


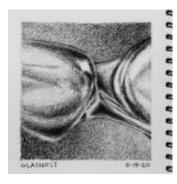
FOUR PAIRS BY BRUCE HEIMBACH

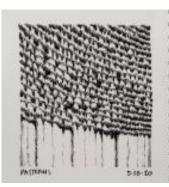
